

HPV Vaccination Starts at 9 Provider and Health Systems Toolbox

Take these communications actions to normalize HPV vaccination at age 9.

- UPDATE recommendations – on websites, in print, for hold messages, etc. - for HPV vaccination by including the following talking points:**

Healthcare providers should start the 2-dose series at the age 9 well visit. Starting the vaccine series and the conversation about HPV vaccination at age 9 will increase the success of completing the series by the patient's 13th birthday.

Giving a strong recommendation at age 9 will increase vaccination success. Starting at age 9 gives health providers and patients time to complete the HPV series before preteens need to get the Tdap and MenACWY vaccines.

The Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices (ACIP) and the Centers for Disease Control (CDC) support vaccination starting at age 9. The ACIP, CDC, the American Academy of Pediatrics, the American Cancer Society, and the National HPV Vaccination Roundtable all agree that HPV vaccination starts at age 9.
